21st ITURBI International Piano Competition València

Over 40 years of international projection in piano from València


The first Iturbi Prize was held in the city of València in 1981, promoted by maestro Joaquín Rodrigo in homage to a renowned Valencian piano figure, maestro José Iturbi.

The aim was to set up a piano competition, promoted by the Provincial Council of València, aimed at projecting promising young pianists in a meeting always marked by the excellence of its participants which, throughout its different editions, has consolidated itself as a benchmark for international piano competitions.

The ITURBI International Piano Competition València, which takes place every two years, is supplemented by a subsequent tour of the finalists around València in addition to recitals and concerts in other countries in the year following the competition. That is why ITURBI now also promotes activities and concerts throughout the year, in an attempt to gain projection in the territory and increasing a quality cultural offer provided by the Department of Culture of the Provincial Council of València to Valencian municipalities.

Thus, the last editions' finalists were able to perform a tour of concerts in municipalities such as Carcaixent, Chelva, Alborache, Massamagrell, Llutxent, La Font d'en Carròs, Godella, Moixent, Sagunt, Quatretonda and Ayora, in a further attempt to decentralise culture and provide high quality concerts in the Valencian regions.

With this 21st edition, the ITURBI International Piano Competition València achieves a remarkable maturity level. It will now be our responsibility, helped by the 22 contestants of the 16 represented nationalities who have reached the final phase, the members of the jury and the director of the Competition, to enhance the name of València and the ITURBI International Piano Prize. Because València is culture, heritage, gastronomy, nature and many other things but, above all, *València is music*.



José Iturbi

After winning the First Prize at the Paris Conservatoire in 1913 - the same year in which Robert Casadesus participated - the truly international career of José Iturbi (València 1895 - Los Angeles 1980) began with his appointment as Professor at the Geneva Conservatoire in 1918. He performed regularly in the Swiss capital with Ansermet and the Orchestre de la Suisse Romande, and at the same time he established a close and productive friendship with Stravinsky, premiering some of his important works for piano.

In 1922 he quit teaching and moved to Paris. During these years he became a regular at the London Proms, invited by Sir Henry Wood, while performing under the orders of G. Pierné, Paul Paray, Pierre Monteux and W. Mengelberg with the most important European orchestras. Here he shared the stage with Enescu, Milstein, Piatigorsky or Philippe Gaubert. Still in Paris, in 1924 he became the first pianist to perform the complete *Suite Iberia* in a single concert.

In 1929 he arrived in the USA with Stokowski and the Philadelphia Orchestra. A few days later he made his début with the New York Philharmonic at Carnegie Hall, where in the following weeks he gave three consecutive recitals which included, among many others, the first New York audition of Liszt's *Transcendental Etudes*, a performance that made him the fifth pianist in history to tackle this series in its entirety.

In May 1933 he made his conducting début in Mexico and in August of this same year he was invited to close the New York Philharmonic's summer season at Lewisohn Stadium. The following year Stokowski made him the principal guest conductor of the Philadelphia Orchestra, regularly conducting orchestras such as the San Francisco and Los Angeles Philharmonic Orchestras, and in 1936 he became the principal conductor of the Rochester Orchestra, with which he recorded some legendary recordings such as Mozart's Concerto in D minor and Gershwin's Rhapsody in blue -conducting from the keyboard-, in his own arrangement for two pianos which he starred in together with his sister Amparo.

After a period in which he performed alongside such prestigious conductors as Toscanini, Mitrópulos, Barbirolli, Beecham and Klemperer, in 1943 he began a short but intense film career that led him to appear in seven feature films for Metro-Goldwyn-Mayer, sharing the screen with Frank Sinatra, Gene Kelly and Judy Garland, collaborations that earned him a star on the Hollywood Walk of Fame. In these years he also won two gold records with the *Polonaise Op. 53* by Chopin and Debussy's *Claire de lune*, becoming the first best-seller in classical music.

After this Hollywood stage he returned to València to conduct the orchestra of his city for two seasons. Today you can find most of his recordings digitised by APR, the National Library of France and Naxos.

The Iturbi Prize is more than just a piano Competition. Since its birth in September 2020 at the ITURBI International Piano Festival València, due to the 125th anniversary of the birth of the Valencian pianist, the presence of this Prize unfolds through a project of greater scope which, every two years, takes over the competition in even-numbered years.



At a time when human relationships, personal, social, commercial, and even diplomatic, are threatened by the phantoms called contagions, Non-vaccination, Lockdown, Quarantine, which can be summed up in the terrible word Coronavirus, which will remain in the history of the human race, the fact that today we are ready once again to serve Music, has represented an enormous amount of work for the whole team. But it gives us great satisfaction to see that we have set up an Iturbi Competition which, even before it began, was already highly rated.

Despite all the difficulties we have broken all previous records with 178 entries from pianists from 41 countries.

This has double merit because due to the pandemic, 6 or 7 of the big International Competitions that should have been held in 2020 were moved to this year, several of them, just before ours.

In addition, it was specified in the rules of the competition that anyone who had been a student of a member of the jury in the last two years could not participate. Normally a Jury is not allowed to vote for its students, but we have gone further. We believe that it is one of the first times (maybe the first?) that this basis of the rules is to be applied in an international competition and we are proud of it.

The avalanche of registrations helped us decide to expand the Jury for the Video Preselection from 3 to 5 jurors, since they had the enormous responsibility of choosing 22 pianists from that formidable list of 178.

And everything seems to indicate that this competition is going to be at a very high level. The purpose of a competition is to find and catapult talent to stardom. Then that talent has to fly with its own wings, but there are candidates in this competition who are already flying high...

I had the immense good fortune to get to know and be friends with José Iturbi.

After the terrible flood of 1957 in València, he organised a tour with the València orchestra, with himself as conductor, to raise funds for the victims. He invited me as a soloist and I played a Mozart concerto with them.

I have wonderful memories of those concerts and the trips in his Rolls Royce with his dog Carracuca and above all his advice.

After that, every time I went to Los Angeles to play, he would come to the concerts and invite Emma and I to his house in Beverly Hills, which was full of pianos and fantastic works of art. We talked a lot about the difficulties of this profession, and of how we wouldn't change it for any other.

This universal man from València who achieved incredible international success through hard and constant work, is an example to follow for the younger generations of pianists, as he was for ours. Let us enjoy these unforgettable days, where we are sure to hear a handful of top-quality pianists, full of dreams and hopes, ready to give the best of themselves.

Welcome to València. Welcome to the Iturbi Competition.

Piano, President of the Competition Jury

Born in Bilbao, Spain, his victory in England at the Liverpool International Competition (one year after Zubin Mehta had won it as conductor) and the rave reviews in the London papers after his debut with the London Symphony in the Royal Festival Hall marked the beginning of his career.

Since then, Achúcarro has had an exceptional, uninterrupted international career. He has toured 61 countries, performing in recital and as soloist in venues such as Avery Fisher Hall , Carnegie Hall, Berlin Philarmonie, Concertgebouw , Kennedy Center, Musikverein, Royal Albert Hall, Teatro alla Scala, Suntory Hall, Sydney Opera House, Teatro Colón... with orchestras including the Berlin Philharmonic, New York Philharmonic, Chicago Symphony , Los Angeles Philharmonic , La Scala , London Philharmonic, London Symphony , Sydney Symphony, BBC Symphony, National de France, Yomiuri, Tokyo Philharmonic, Tokyo Metropolitan, RIAS Berlin and of course, every Spanish Orchestra. He has played with an impressive list of more than 400 conductors such as Abbado, Chailly, Davis, Mehta, Ozawa and Rattle. Van Zweden.

The French Magazine DIAPASON selected one of Achúcarro 's 30 CDs as one of "The Most Beautiful Piano Recordings of All Time "along with legends as Rachmaninoff, Horowitz, Rubinstein, Richter, Cortot, Gould, Brendel. Named "Artist for Peace" by the UNESCO in Paris in recognition of "his extraordinary artistic achievement". He is Accademico ad Honorem of the Accademia Chigiana in Siena, Italy, and in his home country, Achúcarro has received the highest honours in the Arts: the Gold Medal of Fine Arts, The National Prize of Music and the Great Cross of Civil Merit. In 2018 he was named Academico de Honor de la Real Academia de las Bellas Artes de San Fernando and Doctor Honoris Causa por la Universidad Autónoma of Madrid. The International Astronomical Union (IAU) christened the miniplanet 22191 under Achúcarro 's name as a tribute to his successful international career.

His DVD "ACHÚCARRO plays BRAHMS", with Brahms n.2 piano concerto with Sir Colin Davis and London Symphony (Opus Arte), received five -star reviews throughout Europe, and climbed to the top of the Bestsellers and Hot New Releases charts in amazon.com

A few months later, Euroarts released Achúcarro´s new DVD "FALLA and FRIENDS" playing Falla Nights in the Garden of Spain with Berlin Philharmonic and Sir Simon Rattle at the Philarmonie Hall in Berlin, which also garnered critical acclaim.

By the request of Rodrigo, Achúcarro rewrote and recorded for SONY his own revision of Joaquin Rodrigo 's Piano Concerto with the València Orchestra and Manuel Galduf.

He has prize winning recordings of Chopin, Schuman, Ravel, Brahms, Schubert, Beethoven, Bartok, Rachmaninoff Debussy, Herman with SONY, RCA, BMG, Claves, Ensayo, Masters of Arts, Etnos SONY has reissued two of his recordings, his famous "Goyescas" by Granados and his Falla Nights with London Symphony and Eduardo Mata. And in 2019 SONY JAPAN has published a double CD with all the Spanish Music that Achúcarro recorded for them.

He holds the J. E Tate Chair in piano at the Meadows School of the Arts University in adjusting his teaching periods to his busy concert schedule.

Since 2008, the "Joaquin Achúcarro Foundation" - created by a group of individuals and institutions from the Dallas community "to perpetuate his artistic and teaching legacy" - is helping young pianists at the outset of their careers.

Catherine D´Argoubet

Whilst studying medicine, Catherine d'Argoubet created the Piano aux Jacobins Festival against the remarkable backdrop of the cloister in the Dominican monastery, and is now its artistic director. She organises concerts around the globe and works with the finest artists. This festival aims to provide a platform for young artists alongside internationally famous artists bewitched by the ambience of this famous cloister.

In a relatively short space of time, the festival has established a loyal audience. This has enabled the festival to expand its repertoire to include jazz, thanks to Michel Petrucciani, new commissions, the creation of the "One painting, one work" series in the contemporary art museum, and also French romantic music thanks to a partnership with the Bru-Zane Foundation.

In 1986, she founded the musical series *Les Grands Interprètes* en Toulouse (The great musicians of Toulouse) and invited the finest conductors including C.M. Giulini, N. Harnoncourt, B. Haitink, S. Ozawa, R. Muti, P. Boulez, L. Maazel, C. Von Dohnanyi, Z. Mehta, R. Chailly, V. Gergiev, Y. Termikanov, M. Tilson Thomas and Y. Nezet Séguin. As a result, the foremost orchestras visit Toulouse: Scala of Milan, Concentus Musicus of Vienna, Vienna Philharmonic, Leipzig Gewandhaus Orchestra, Concertgebouw, LSO, San Francisco Symphony, Saint Petersburg Philharmonic and Mariinsky Theater Orchestra, among others.



Ana Guijarro

Ana Guijarro, born in Madrid in 1955, is one of the most renowned pianists of her generation. Trained mainly at the Real Conservatorio Superior de Música in Madrid with the distinguished pianists Antonio Lucas Moreno and Carmen Díez Martín, her most decisive reference, she furthered her studies in Rome under the direction of Guido Agosti and at the École Normale de Musique in Paris, following the advice of Marian Rybicki.

From a very early age she has been giving chamber music recitals, solo and in ensembles, and concerts with an orchestra. She has performed in prestigious auditoriums and halls in the most important European cities, and also in Canada and the United States.

She has performed as soloist with the Orquesta Nacional de Oporto, Montréal Chamber Players, London Symphony Orchestra, Orquesta de la Comunidad de Madrid, Orquesta Andrés Segovia, Real Orquesta Sinfónica of Sevilla, Orquesta Filarmónica of Málaga, with conductors Yuri Simonov, Viékoslav Sutej, Max Bragado, Leo Brower, Francisco de Gálvez, Juan Luis Pérez, José Luis Temes, Jeffrey Schindler, Ernst Martínez Izquierdo, Pedro Halffter, Collin Metters, Manuel Hernández Silva, among others.

She is well-versed in the piano works of the distinguished composer of Seville Manuel Castillo, to whom she has devoted a significant part of her professional career.

She has received several prizes and distinctions, including the *Diploma* of *Honour* obtained at the great International F. Chopin competition, Warsaw 1980.

She has been a member of the Jury in important piano performance awards, highlighting her participation as President of the Jury and member of the Advisory Board of the *Premio Jaén* International Piano Competition in four editions, between 2012 and 2015.

In 1982 she obtained a piano professorship after passing a public competition examination, and she exercised her teaching work at the Alicante and Seville Higher Conservatories of Music, where she was seconded until 1997. She continued her teaching activity at the Real Conservatorio Superior de Música in Madrid where she has been Professor of Piano until she retired in 2020, and Director in two periods, the first between 2012 and 2013, and the second between 2014 and 2020.

Being deeply and actively interested in music teaching, she has been in great demand by young pianists from all over Spain and abroad to study under her tutelage since her beginnings as a professor in Conservatories. She has an innumerable trail of students who hold responsible positions in music teaching, not only in Spain but also in EU countries. She has also trained some of the most relevant current pianists, some of them having been awarded in the most prestigious international competitions.



Paolo Pinamonti

Born in 1958, Paolo Pinamonti graduated in Philosophy at Venice University and Piano at National Conservatory of Padua (Italy). Since 1992 he has been professor of History of Contemporary Music and History of Film Music at the University Ca' Foscari in Venice.

From 1997 to 2000 was the Artistic Director of Theatre La Fenice in Venice (Italy). During the 1999 season of La Fenice he was granted three awards «Abbiati» by the Music Critics National Association.

From 2001 to 2007 was General Manager and Artistic Director of São Carlos Theatre in Lisbon (Portugal).

From 2007 to 2010 he was Artistic Director of the lyric summer festival: "Mozart Festival" in La Coruña (Spain).

From 2011 to 2015 he was the first foreign Artistic Director of the Zarzuela Theatre in Madrid (Spain). During the 2012 and 2014 seasons he was granted with the lyric awards "Campoamor" by the Music Critics National Association of Spain for the best Spanish production. The production of Los Diamantes de la Corona, by Francisco Asenjo Barbieri, presented in November 2014, has been selected in the 2015 edition of the London Opera Awards in the category: "Best Rediscovered Work".

From 2015 to 2020 he was Artistic Director of the "Teatro di San Carlo" in Naples (Italy). During these years he collaborated with important conductors as: Riccardo Muti, Zubin Mehta, Juray Valcuha, Nello Santi, Valery Gergev, Pinchas Steinberg, Vladimir Fedossev, Pinchas Zuckerman, Maxim Vengerov and Neeme Järvi.

In 2019 he was artistic director of the 67° edition of Ravello Festival (Salerno-Italy).

Besides to his artistic job in the directions of the theatres, he has continued his scientific activity. Among his editions are to be referred a series of works about Manuel de Falla. He was also the author of the critical edition of the opera Sigismondo by Rossini (Mailand ed. Ricordi, 2011), which was presented in the Rossini Opera Festival (2010).

In 2006 was appointed "Commander of the Infante D. Enrique Order" by the President of Portuguese Republic, dr. Jorge Sampaio.

In 2014 was appointed "Officer of Order of "Stella d'Italia" by the Presidente of Italian Republic, dr. Giorgio Napolitano.

In 2015, the Culture Ministry of Spain gave him the "Encomenda con Placa" of the order of "Alfonso X el Sabio".



Jorge Luis Prats

Since May 2007, when Jorge Luis Prats performed for the first time at the Miami International Piano Festival, his career has experienced a meteoric rise. His début in the prestigious "Meister Pianisten" series at the Concertgebouw in Amsterdam was received with such a standing ovation that in 2010 he returned to the same series for the third time, an honour previously reserved only for Brendel and Sokolov.

In May 2010 he replaced Nelson Freire in a recital at the Salle Pleyel in Paris with such an extraordinary success of audience that it was repeated in September of that same year at the festival Piano aux Jacobins in Toulouse. Due to these successes he was invited by the organisers of prestigious French series in Autumn 2011 such as Les grandes Interpretes de Lyon, the Grand Théatre de Aix en Provence and re-invitations to the Piano 4 Étoiles series at the Salle Pleuel and to perform Rachmaninoff with the Orchestre de Paris and Paavo Järvi.

He has performed in Europe, Latin America, China, Japan and Korea and has played with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra in London, BBC Symphony Orchestra, Dallas Symphony, etc. In Mexico with the Mexico City Orchestra, the OFUNAM Orchestra and the Jalapa Orchestra and in South America with the Columbia Philharmonic, the Simon Bolivar and the Caracas Municipal Orchestra.

He is regularly invited as a professor by institutions such as the National University of Colombia in Bogotá, National School of the Arts in Havana, Centro de las Artes in Mexico, Conservatory of Córdoba in Spain, Royal Conservatory of Toronto, and he was also Artistic Director of the National Orchestra of Cuba from 1985 to 2002.

Jorge Luis Prats, born in Camaguey, Cuba, in 1956, studied with Cesar Perez Sentenar, Barbara Diaz Alea, Margot Rojas and Alfredo Díez at the Escuela Nacional de las Artes. After graduating, he was granted a scholarship to study at the Tchaikovsky Conservatory in Moscow, where he studied with Rudolf Kerer and continued his studies at the Paris Conservatory and the Hochschule in Vienna. With Paul Badura Skoda and Magda Tagliaferro.

At the age of 21 he won the first prize at the Marguerite Long-Jacques Thibaud Competition in Paris and also the special prize for the best interpretation of Ravel and Jolivet.

Jorge Luis Prats' discography includes the first recording of Scriabin's 24 Preludes, Concertos by Beethoven, Grieg, Rachmaninoff and Chopin, in addition to works by Cuban composers. His concert at the Broward Center for the Performing Arts for the Miami International Piano Festival was recorded and released as a DVD for VAI.

Jorge Luis signed an exclusive contract with DECCA and his first recording with them was Granados' Goyescas, which was released in June 2011.



Menahem Pressler

"Menahem Pressler's joyous pianism — technically faultless, stylistically impeccable, emotionally irrepressible — is from another age and is a virtually forgotten sensibility. He is a National Treasure", Los Angeles Times.

Recognized by the French and German governments with the highest honors those countries award to civilians, Menahem Pressler is considered one of the great pianists performing today.

A founding member and the pianist of the Beaux Arts Trio for all of its 51 years, he is one of the world's most distinguished and honored musicians, with a career that spans nearly seven decades.

Celebrating his 96th birthday in December 2019, Mr. Pressler has enjoyed an unprecedented resurgence of his solo career.

He was featured in concertos by Mozart and Beethoven with the London Philharmonic, NHK Symphony, and Swedish Radio Symphony, and received rave reviews as the featured soloist with the Berlin Philharmonic and Sir Simon Rattle during their New Year's Eve performance broadcast live throughout the world. He also performed with the Royal Concertgebouw Orchestra under the baton of Trevor Pinnock, the Berlin Philharmonic with Seymon Bychkov, and the Mariinsky Orchestra with Valery Gergiev, and has given acclaimed Lieder recitals with Christoph Prégardien and Matthias Goerne. His recitals last season included Tokyo Suntory Hall and Hamburg Elbphilharmonie. His latest recording of French Music for Deutsche Grammophon entitled Clair de Lune came out in 2018. He gives Masterclasses all over the world and is Distinguished Professor at the Jacobs School of Music, University of Indiana in Bloomington since 65 years. He is one of the most lauded musicians of our time.

Secretary General of the Geneva International Music Competition President of the World Federation of International Music Competitions (WFIMC)


A musician and arts manager, Didier Schnorhk has been Secretary General of the Geneva International Music Competition and responsible for its artistic, administrative and financial management since 1999. Having held the position of Vice President of the World Federation of International Music Competitions since 2006, he was elected President in 2015 and re-elected in 2018.

He was born in Geneva in 1962 to a family of musicians. Initially studying classical literature, he then trained as a cellist at the Conservatory of Geneva. For 15 years he worked as a freelance musician, playing in various groups and orchestras in the region, such as the Orchestre de la Suisse Romande, Geneva Chamber Orchestra and Lausanne Sinfonietta. In 1995, he decided to move into artistic management and became Assistant to the Conductor Thierry Fischer, with whom he had founded the Geneva Chamber Orchestra in 1992.

Passionate about transferring knowledge and mediation, he has written a variety of texts for the programmes of evening concerts he has organised; in addition, he often gives public conferences to present the works. He is a regular contributor to radio programmes at Swiss National Broadcasting RTS and professional workshops at Geneva's University of Music. He has worked as a consultant in the creation of a new international music competition in Singapore.

His commitment to Geneva's musical and cultural community and his interest in contemporary creativity have led to some important roles, including Member of the Board of Geneva University of Music, President of the Archipel Festival (different types of modern music), member of the Ensemble Contrechamps Committee (contemporary music) and President of the Department of Fine Art, Music and Literature of the National Institute of Geneva. He is also involved in politics and has chaired the Cultural Commission of the Geneva Socialist Party as well as being active within several associative cultural movements.

Didier Schnorhk has been awarded the "Pierre & Louisa Meylan Foundation" Prize in December 2019, for his work and commitment in the Geneva International Music Competition.



Josu de Solaun

Josu de Solaun, of Spanish and American nationality, is the winner of the XIII George Enescu International Piano Competition of Bucharest (2014), whose list of winners includes distinguished names in modern piano, such as Radu Lupu and Elisabeth Leonskaja, thus becoming the first Spaniard to win this competition. He won the First Prize at the Fifteenth José Iturbi International Piano Competition in València, being again the only Spanish pianist awarded in its more than 30 editions, and in 2009 he received the First Prize and Audience Award at the First European Community Piano Competition held in Prague, where he was chosen as the only pianist representing Spain.


He has performed as soloist with orchestras such as the Mariinsky Theatre of St. Petersburg, La Fenice Philharmonic Orchestra of Venice, RTVE Orchestra, Dublin Radio and Television Orchestra, National Symphony Orchestra of Colombia, National Radio Orchestra of Bucharest, George Enescu Philharmonic Orchestra of Bucharest, Czech Radio Orchestra, Port Angeles Symphony Orchestra of Washington, Monterey Symphony Orchestra of California, Real Filharmonia de Galicia, València Orchestra, Euskadi Symphony Orchestra, Virginia Symphony Orchestra, American Ballet Theater Orchestra of New York, and Mexico City Philharmonic.

As a recitalist, he has performed in Spain, Romania, Russia, Ukraine, Italy, Bulgaria, Japan, China, Taiwan, United States, Chile, Switzerland, France, Czech Republic, Holland, Germany, Mexico, United Kingdom and Canada, in venues such as the Kenneddy Center in Washington, Carnegie Hall, Metropolitan Opera in New York, Athenaeum in Bucharest, Sala Silvestre Revueltas in Mexico, Teatro Monumental in Madrid, Auditorio Nacional de Música in Madrid, Salle Cortot in Paris, Southbank Centre in London, Schumann Haus in Leipzig, Palau de la Música and Palau de les Arts in València.

He is a graduate of the Manhattan School of Music of New York, he studied for 12 years under the tutelage of Russian pianist Nina Svetlanova and Cuban pianist Horacio Gutiérrez. In Spain he studied with María Teresa Naranjo and Ana Guijarro (piano) and with the composer and conductor Salvador Chuliá (harmony, counterpoint, fugue and composition). His chamber music teachers were David Soyer and Michael Tree (of the Guarnieri Quartet), Isidore Cohen (of the Beaux Arts Trio), and Robert Mann (Juilliard Quartet).

His discography includes a record with works by Stravinsky for NAXOS (2016), the complete works of George Enescu on three records for NAXOS (2017), the record "Fantasque" (AUDITE) awarded with the prestigious ICMA 2021 award and his recently released record "Disgressions" (IBS Classical) 2021.

In 2019, the Romanian Government awarded him the Order of Cultural Merit.

At the helm of IMG Artists, the Company has expanded its presence across the Americas, Europe and Asia. Barrett Wissman's commitment to music began at an early age with serious piano study. He made several debuts as a concert pianist with prominent orchestras from the age of 11 and won several national and international competitions thereafter. He graduated cum laude from Yale University and went on to receive graduate degrees in music from Southern Methodist University and the Accademia Chigiana in Italy.



Mr. Wissman has most recently founded one of the leading management firms in the social media business advising talent, brands, companies and non-profit organizations on their strategies in the social media business.

Most recently, Mr. Wissman co-founded the W Preserve in Montana with Nina Kotova. to create a haven for performers, visual artists, writers and thinkers alike.it Is a retreat where artists can meet, exchange ideas and perform.



Orchestra of València

The Orchestra of València was created in 1943 under the baton of Joan Lamote de Grignon. In its already lengthy existence it has travelled abroad on many occasions, including tours of England and France (1950), Italy and Turkey with M. Rostropovich as soloist (1996), Germany (2002) and Austria and Czech Republic with pianist Joaquín Achúcarro (2008) as well as performances in the International Music Festivals of Schleswig-Holstein and Neuer Musik in Zurich.

The directors were H. von Benda, N. Annovazzi, H. Unger, J. Iturbi, E. García Asensio, Pedro Pirfano, García Navarro, Martínez Palomo, Benito Lauret, Manuel Galduf, Miguel Ángel Gómez Martínez and Yaron Traub. Since September 2017 the Titular and Artistic Director of the Orchestra is Ramón Tebar.

From 2016 to 2019, he studied at the Royal Birmingham Conservatoire on a full scholarship with Professor Pascal Nemirovski.



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
